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Phillips System Deserves Oblivion?

The President of the American Maritime Scholarship Club recently asked members for their opinions of a resolution passed by the Board of Directors of the *Myra Tamm Clark* of America. The Board, in effect, went on record against sailing systems such as the Knight's and Phillips'. It appears that the Board doesn't feel that such ratings or cumulative awards are fair to the exhibitor "who has superior dogs, but whose breeders think him as fit to the number of occasions in which he may show his dogs as such systems give undue weight to small shows in which there is very limited competition."

Mr. William Kendrick, applied the Slaye Club fat is used in a column in DOG WORLD's July issue. He wrote: "As one who has long felt that every person and canine owner should contribute as best he or she is able to the best interests of our sport, we commend the Directors of the Slaye Club for their far-sightedness and desire to hope that the dog food companies and kennel publications which furnish such ratings and recommendations will see the light and compile lists to the edification of all owners."

I wonder if Mr. Kraschick means that a large part of Pure Blood Dogs, the American Kennel Gazette, should be assigned to oblivion. I ask this because months after month a large portion of the Gazette is devoted to publishing ratings of dogs. After all, each time a judge enters a ring he is presented with a number of dogs to inspect, and is asked to give them ratings in the form of placements. The winners in his rating system get points. The American Kennel Club makes a cumulative award of a Championship after a certain number of such wins. Is this not an obvious disservice to the sport? I don't know anyone who sees a champion win, thinks of

Basically, showing dogs is a competitive sport. Remove the competition and a dog show would be no more than a canine zoo, and how many of us would be interested in exhibiting? The racing systems are no more than an extension, and it seems to me a logical one, of the competition that takes place at a single show.

I, personally, cannot escape the conclusion that the Skyy's Board, and Mr. Kennedy, is so anxious to be rid of what they consider to be an anomaly that they are willing to use the baby shamus and with the buttstroke. Certainly these filing systems have NIMS value, or they would never have gotten off the ground at all, much less endured. Let's examine the pros and cons briefly.

There is still in the argument that it is easier to win five BBS at 500, entry dog shows than it is to win one BBS at a 2,500-dog show, and the taking system reward the same number of points in either case. It also would seem easier to beat 29 Minnesota Schnauzers (often the same 20) five times than to take the breed in a 100-dog Specialty, again, for the same number of points. Perhaps some sort of weighting factor could be introduced to correct this. But if the shows is a *stale*, then we should it be unfair for an owner, unable to win in his own neighborhood, to take his dog to the breedshows where his dogs are required for success, and the quality perhaps not so high, and make him a champion there.

But I think what rankles most of the using systems' critics is that only a few get to the top. They resent the fact that there are those among us with the money to buy an excellent dog and pay to have him handled expertly. They resent the fact that some among us have the time to travel to distant shores

And, though they would never admit it, they resent the fact that others have more patience and are willing to work harder than they do. In this regard, perhaps there is significance in the fact that ONE Sprocket has virtually dominated the spring systems for the past several years.

Now for the plus side. After you kneed and/or finish your first champion, what next? Unless you leave the sport, certainly the next step is to try for the dog that can win groups and best's. Who would suffer the time, trouble, expense, mood, sweat, and tears involved even in trying to do this if these same can see no recognition for success? It is a part of human nature to put things in as order or rank. Would every people be interested in baseball, or the other big-time sports, if such game was played for itself alone, and no account kept of which team had won the most games?

I am sure that the systems used by the AEC, Phillips, Knight, or KENNELL REVIEW or its Atomic Awards, could be improved. I say this because I believe that any thing that humans can create, they can make better. I also believe that an official connected with any of the above-named groups would have a dead ear to a well-thought-out, constructive suggestion toward improvement of the system involved. I am also sure that all of these systems are the result of a considerable amount of thought and work.

So far heaven's sake, let's not be paranoid and non-headed about this. If you can't think of a way to improve any or all of these systems, why ask that they be abolished? If you're against them because you don't see them, why not say so, and then keep quiet and let the others have their fun?

And if you honestly can see no point or reason for the competitive rating of dogs, why are you in this sport?

Bernie Molitor, USKBTC president, attended the show, and led an interesting discussion on the Standard after the dinner, particularly on the prospects of our size disqualification. Other guests were SF president, Ed Dalton, and his wife, Northern secretary, Jo LeFebvre, Bob Perry and Frank and Margaret McGrath, and New Yorker Hans Bjerre.

The day before, at Ventura County Dog Fanciers Association, there was a major in each sex. BOB and BIS to Chances Are, with 2549 dogs entered. BOS to Mildred and Emerson Snyder's Ch. McNamara Irish Colleen, shown by Joe Waterman; WB and BOW to owner-shown Neil Hudson's Townshend's Michaela O'Kelly; WD, Robert Perry's The Rogue of Kerry Oaks, shown by Eddie Boyes; RD, Lovell Moore's Tontine's Gitano; RB, R. R. Stephenson's Ellenblu's Lovely.

We cannot say enough about these two shows! Every year the sky is blue with lots of sunshine, cooled with the ocean breeze, and you show in very large grass rings. At Santa Barbara there is a place close to the tent where you can unload and then park on grass. Ralph Thorpe hung a Kerry banner at the entrance to our aisle so everyone could find the Kerries quickly, and Fran did an excellent job of arranging the trophy table with the USKBTC cloth and the many silver trophies.

There is a great difference in the care of a litter of four to six puppies, and a litter of from seven to 10. The owner should realize that, in order to keep these puppies in optimum condition, he must help the dam. The

puppies should be weighed every day. Each day, the one or two smallest should be given an opportunity to nurse by themselves. If there are more than eight puppies it would be advisable that, right from the first day, half the litter should nurse the dam while the other half is kept in a box warmed by an electric pad with a towel over it, and bottle fed. They should be changed every hour or two, of course.

Goat's milk, diluted half-and-half with water, usually agrees very well with all puppies, and they like it. Esbilac and some of the other formulas are also good, or you may mix a special formula; there are many good ones with Karo syrup included as the dam's milk is sweeter than cow's milk. When there are between six and eight puppies, we usually start bottle feeding the third day, and continue it until the eyes open. As "cracks" appear in the eyes, we start feeding crumbs of raw ground round, and by 16 days, each puppy is getting a piece as large as a walnut. A day or two, after the eyes open, they are getting canned milk and hot water in a pan and learning to lap; and, a day later, we put the meat in a pan with hot water and salt and about 1/4 cup of fine puppy meal—it should be quite juicy for them for the first two weeks. Especially with these large litters, a few drops of vitamin every day is recommended. We weigh them every day until they are six weeks old, and then once a week for some months.

Bernice Kusch of Oregon is going through all this as her Shawn B. Glory just presented her with a litter of 10 sired by our Terry.

The July Gazette included shows, until May 22, and we have three new group winners: Ch. Blue Muff of Kilcoole, Ch. Carholme Charles and Ch. Fellbrinn's Skibbereen. "Chances Are" added 4 more BOS to his record.

FLASH — The Schnauzers' members, Ch. Melba's Chance Ann, broke all records for her breed with title concerning RHM in show, five of them in one weekend on the California Circuit, including his best BS up to date!

The Section-10 specialty weekend at Chateau was the most brilliant exhibitor weekend that day since all the salsos. Headquarters were the Hospitality Inn set in the great Chateau country, with the museum held Friday in one of their meeting rooms. It started with Zappi Pfenber giving a message from Bertha Libenthal, one of those who wrote out husband, and a discussion of the breed. It was disappointing that we were unable to get to present a comment from the American Kennel Club on our proposed height disqualification. Next, Edith Lantz did a chalk talk on movement of the dog and how this is controlled by his physical makeup, with films of a good young Kerry. Buffet lunch was then served in the room next door.

At 1 P.M., Dr. Fox showed films on the behavior of wild animals such as tigers, apes, and wolves, and also pictures of dog which had been left alone at certain periods. The Fox's discussion was an extension of what is found in Phyllis Long's wonderful book on dog behavior. Knowledge of the puppy's reaction in response to stimuli, early weeks of his life is real information for all breeders. After many questions and a coffee break, colored slides were shown of four shows in Southern California including the U.S. specialty at Santa Barbara, with a cordial invitation from So. Cal. puppy, Mr. Sam, for everyone to attend one of the shows next year. Then U.S. puppy, Bruce Matton, introduced his panel of Jerry Miller, Fritz Reuter, Henry Sargent and Edith Lantz. A most interesting discussion on the breed was held between the panel and the audience. After dinner the hospitality room was open to all exhibitors and friends.

There were 20 Kerrys entered for Jim Trullinger at Riverside, with temperature about 95, and handled by about the same! Tom showed the grooming and showing ones. Ben of Bred at Miss Patricia Bick's Chateau Kennels, Marquette, handled by Ted Perry, RHM, to Mr. and Mrs. Fred Sargent. Ch. Libenthal's Jerry's Gogger Hamsel, WD and RHM, Terry Tolan's Callaway's Handmade, a handsome, handled by Betty Sargent, WD, Don Terry's Marquette's Double Image, RD, from the puppy class, Honor Perry and Pat Bick's Chateau's Double Image, RD, handled, RD to Jim Hansen's Barking Belinda, handled by George Ward. Everyone, except

the U.S. board, then hurried back to the cool room and to good. The board held a meeting during the day.

The U.S. dinner was held with 80 attending, including Mrs. Whittier from Marquette Beach, Don Tolan, Edith Lantz, Barbara and Henry Sargent and from Riverside from California, the Perry and the Tompkins, Zappi Pfenber, Pat Corley and Barbara Weiss, Indefinite editor, Mad. Jerry Gorman, the Janka Mills from the East Coast, Margie Steinman from Trenton, Mr. and Mrs. Blalock from Virginia (one boy was to be a representative at the Democratic Convention in Chicago), Russ Lightner from Canada, Betty Leche and Aubrey Scotland from Chicago, and just about everyone from the Philadelphia club.

Handed dinner a perfect end to a great day for the specialty. The Chateau show is held on a polo field surrounded by tall grass trees. The Kerry was most on top as it was a bright blue. We drove right in to the school, and found that the Philadelphia club had provided a complete continental buffet table, with Irish cake, coffee, tea, milk, hot coffee cakes, all that! And the ring was under the trees, so as you entered you could also watch every class being judged—such a wonderful feature for an exhibitor who handles his own horses—as you did not need to miss a single dog!

There was an entry of 49 old pups, Maxine Frances Bernfield, who found her RHM of Bred in Russ Bick's was presented to Champion Caroline Charlie, which they were on to group show (the Winner was RHM). Gary handled Charles at track, but he had been rescued by Ted Bernfield, who did a beautiful job. We kept our names well about Chateau as he looked that day — he moved with so much drive and spirit that he looked as if he was going to a five-star something for a year or so. Last, he came in his Best Dog class with five of his pups, RHM to Pat Bick's Ch. Kenneth Maxwell, WD and RHM, for another season, in Don Tolan's Callaway's Pfenber, RD, Bob Edgerton's Ann Bick Galois, chosen by Jennifer Zappi Pfenber, WD, Ben Tolan's Marquette's Double Image, and RD, Zappi Pfenber's Ann Bick Some Mary.

There were 11 puppies in Birmingham for Judge Gene Leche, who found her best puppy in Maxine Perry and Pat Bick's Kenneth Pfenber, second to his line sister, Kenneth Henry Lee, third, the latest, "unofficial" Townsend's Double Lady, and fourth in Russ Bick's Marquette's Double Image. There was so much quality in the Birmingham and similar classes that I will mention them all. It gave everyone a very helpful feeling and opened up the prospect of several new studs.

Out of the show days of total dog talk came many ideas. The board and members realized

how deep in the feeling that some attendance and discussion should be made in the Standard, and it was proposed that the club should take two or three more, at all the Standard Schenker and Dedication clubs, and after a large committee work on this proposal, it would then be submitted to the breeders and officially to all members of the discussion. We

will discuss some of the other matters next month.

The Chicago KBTTC joined with an other, several clubs in having a match in August, which drew a pair of 300 points. RHM was the Winner's Bick's Blue Flare of Stat, and Best Puppy, E. Doreen's Tina. Best champion points were earned for Chateau club.

The August Gazette included shows in June 15. Another RHM winner appears in the show with the addition of Ch. Max Perry of Pfenber. An asterisk next to the name means the first time in the show.

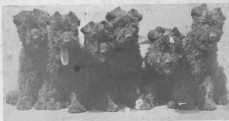

The way to train a Kerry is by showing it what you want it to do, and something is, rather than punishing it after the accident has happened. The way to train a puppy at a few days is to keep it by your side while in the house. Keep all doors closed and let the puppy only in the kitchen or family room, wherever you happen to be during the day. Put down newspapers near the outside door, so if the puppy comes "in," it can see them. Take the puppy out EVERY hour just after it wakes from a nap, and, of course, after eating. Walk with it, and go to the part of the yard where you want him to go.

One newer owner said that her puppy had the bad habit of snoring out of the car box. A neighbor's dog did this also until the day a One-Day blind vicar was in town. Vicar was for humans are all right for dogs, but there are more vicar men, especially those that remain on the right amount of the various vicar men and vicar men they need. We are not only a vicar man, but we can't be sure our food is good if we're not in it, but we also give powdered bone meal.

Also a dog should have a bone meal sprinkle in its diet—either puppy or adult. One way to help this particular puppy would be to put the car box in front of the car so the car could still keep up.

THE STORY of CRUFT'S

CRUFTS DOG SHOW

IF CHARLES CRUFT had followed in his father's footsteps and had become a jeweller, there never would have been a Cruft's Dog Show. After leaving college in 1876, Charles Cruft joined James Spratt in his newly-formed business in London of selling "dog cakes." Spratt had just returned from America where "dog cakes" were invented and at that time enjoying a great success. After a short apprenticeship as office boy, Charles Cruft was promoted to traveller and visited the kennels of sporting dogs of large estates. After a time, he was sent to the Continent to call on kennels there and, in 1878, he was invited by French dog breeders to undertake the promotion of the canine section of the Paris Exhibition.

This experience led him in 1880 to accept an opportunity to manage the Allied Terrier Club Show held at the Royal Aquarium, London. In 1891, he booked the Royal Agricultural Hall in London for the first of a long series of Cruft's shows. At the turn of the century, the name Cruft's had become synonymous with dog shows. In those days, it was possible for an individual to run a dog show for personal profit and Charles Cruft undoubtedly made a great financial success of his shows. Today, there are no privately owned dog shows and the Kennel Club will only grant licenses to non-profit-making organizations.

Charles Cruft died in 1938, and his widow organized one show in February 1939. In 1942, Mrs. Cruft decided that she could no longer be responsible for the show her husband had made world-famous, and, to perpetuate the name, she asked The Kennel Club to take over the organization. Six years later, the first Cruft's show under The Kennel Club jurisdiction was held at Olympia. It was an immediate success and since then it has gone on breaking its own records each year. On February 7 and 8, 1969 the 73rd Cruft's show was held.

1956 marked the Golden Jubilee Cruft's Dog Show. In that year, there were 4597 dogs entered. When the show was revived by The Kennel Club in 1948, there were 4273 dogs entered. By 1964, the number of dogs entered had grown to 8277 and the growth and success of Cruft's was presenting problems. It became clear that some restrictions would have to be applied. For the 1965 show, it was decided to increase the minimum age for puppies at Cruft's from six to eight months. This resulted in an entry of 8000 dogs at this show. In 1966, there were 7775 dogs.

In 1967, The Kennel Club decided to restrict the show to Champions: Show Champions, Field Trial Champions, Working Trial Champions and Obedience Champions, and to dogs which had won First, Second or Third prizes in Breed Classes at Championship shows, held during 1966.

The result of this action was a drop in the entry to 6845 dogs at the 1967 show. The entry for the 1968 show was very near to that of 1967; the entry for 1969 was 7886.

Cruft's has played a most important part in the export of dogs from England to all parts of the world. The show attracts visitors from all over the world and anyone who has seen the event knows what a fantastic show it is.

In 1947, only 577 dogs were exported from England. In 1948, the figure had risen to 1280 and, in 1968 to 12,791. It works out that ONE OUT OF EVERY TWELVE PUPPIES BORN IN THE YEAR IN ENGLAND is exported! In twenty-two years there have been almost 100,000 dogs exported.

The top export countries in 1968 were: United States of America, 4496; Japan, 2910; Canada, 742; France, 570; West Germany, 593; Italy, 585; Holland, 290; Sweden, 238; Australia, 177; and South Africa, 177.

The popular breeds are: Yorkshire Terriers, 3743; Toy Poodles, 1076; Cairn Terriers, 607; West Highland White Terriers, 593; Labrador Retrievers, 585; Pekingese, 530; Dalmatians, 450; Shet-

land Sheepdogs, 426; Welsh Corgis (Pembroke), 414; and Miniature Poodles, 410.

There are over 20,000 prefixes registered with The Kennel Club. In five years, 750,000 dogs have been registered with The Kennel Club, although American Kennel Club registrations for the year 1968 exceeded that figure.

There are over 2000 dog shows held each year in England and Cruft's, though not the biggest as the West of England Ladies Kennel Association had an entry of over 10,000 dogs in 1968, is still the magic name that attracts more people and it receives more publicity throughout the world than any other dog show.

This year Her Majesty The Queen will visit Cruft's Show on Friday February 7. This will be the first time that a reigning monarch has visited the show. Cruft's Show acquired the crown that appears on its insignia shortly after its inception in 1881, when Queen Victoria patronized the show with a number of entries from her large kennel of various breeds.

Queen Victoria entered a Collie, a Skye Terrier and three Pomeranians at Cruft's in 1893. In the same year, The Prince of Wales entered a Flat-Coated Retriever, four Basenjis and a dog of unknown pedigree and Princess Alexandra showed several St. Bernards, a foreign dog of unspecified breeding and a Basset. In 1892, Queen Victoria entered three dogs: Princess Henry of Battenberg four dogs; His Imperial Majesty The Czar of Russia an unspecified number of dogs; and the Grand Duke Nicholas of Russia entered 39 Borzoi, Prince Constantin of Oldenbourg, thirteen Borzoi.

The teams of Borzoi were accompanied by Russian muskies and Russian kennelmen, all dressed in typical Russian dress, and the London crowds flocked to see them. In Imperial fashion, the dogs were all presented after the show to members of the Royal Family and acquaintances of the Czar and Grand Duke, and this stock was the foundation of the Borzoi in Britain today.

However, the Royal Family no longer exhibits their dogs at Cruft's. The last occasion was in 1938 when the late King George VI showed two Labradors.

The chairman and the committee of Cruft's Dog Show gave a Press Luncheon at The Kennel Club in London on January 8. This writer had the pleasure of being present. Next month, I will bring you the story of Cruft's 1969.

Registration Figures Show Wide Diversity

TOTAL individual registrations for 1968 were 909,300 compared to 885,800 in 1967, an increase of 2.7%. Litter registrations for 1968 were 404,175 compared to 379,775 in 1967, an increase of 6.4%.

Among the six groups it is interesting to note that the increase of 11% in Terrier registrations is the highest.

Poodle registrations are greater than in any other breed. They

Among the breeds of which more than 250 were registered, the largest percentage increases were recorded by Bull Terriers with 48%, Old English Sheepdogs with 47% and Lhasa Apso with 45%.

THE SHAME OF TURNOVER

by Seymour N. Weiss

It has been said that in the present day the average tenure of one who enters into active participation in the dog sport is between three and five years. We who show dogs year in and year out know this to be very true. There seems to be two reasons for showing dogs. It would be difficult for anyone to say what percentage of these new fanciers would develop into defense assets to the Kerry breed, but one cannot help thinking how many who do drop out of dogs after a few years might have done our breed tons of good had they developed along the proper lines.

A professional dog writer of the editor's acquaintance has said that to the novice the dog game is a bed of roses, but the newcomer soon invariably to step on the thorns. There are a good many reasons for this and their investigation should be of great interest.

To the serious fancier the dog game is not a money-making proposition. Indeed most of us give not a thought to the profit motive, and it is only a rare year when our books show as in the blank. Notwithstanding there are many who think in terms of and live, puppy sales and growing charges and don't find out about the other side of the ledger until they have been at it for a time. It is safe to say that these

people can never be an asset to any breed, and their dropping out of the sport is no loss to any of us. What is a loss to us is the fancier who would truly like to do well in and for dogs. For whenever means the serious type fancier that makes us all suffer for it. Many times a person becomes discouraged by his own doing. A failure to recognize the shortcomings in his own dogs is often the reason for going up to disappointment. All of us here human beings first, and find it awkward to say to someone "You know your dog, really should not be shown." While such a comment can only be made with the best interests of the breed at heart, few of us can or would be willing to say this to someone with equanimity. It becomes necessary to ask ourselves "What is more important? The last feelings of a novice who cannot win with what he is showing or the well-being of the breed we profess an interest in." If we seriously want the best for our beloved dogs we must all sooner or later answer this question and arrive at a determination.

There are many kinds of novice fanciers. There is the individual who shows his dogs as an arena in which to put out his own ideas as to be important, to be in the spotlight, to be on display. With this individual we can only hope that the needs of the breed and the sta-

bility of the one of serious breeders and fanciers will encourage him to become one of their number. For if this does not happen his interests will also wane and in a short time he will be heard from no more. The fancier who is attracted to the dog game by the glitter of silk and silver would do well to think of that which is less far the breed rather than to collect a few piddling baubles with which to impress his neighbors. Similar to the exhibitionist, he will not last long if show ring honors are his only aim.

The future of the breed lies with those who seriously love the breed, and if they find that the dog they are showing is not quite good enough we hope they will not drop the whole thing as a bad lot, but keep the pet dog to use the game with, and add a better dog to their household for their own greater satisfaction and for the greater good of the breed which should be foremost in the minds of each and everyone of us.

The KBTCC of Northern California held a fun match with 17 entered. Best Puppy was Bill Calley's hatched, Westford Robin, and John Lynch's Westford Valiant Knight was BOS. Best Adult to George Ross's Miss Molly. Bill Calley has been having a wonderful time with his first litter . . . Westford Aiding was BOB and GR1 at a 1206-dog match, at Daly City; and at Napa with 890 entered, Westford Maeve West was Group Second, the dam is Ch. Melbee's Michaela, litter sister of Chances Are, and the sire, Josang's Sky Jester.

1968 was one of the best years our breed has had in show wins as the Schlesingers' Ch. Melbee's Chances Are won top dog all-breeds in the U. S. In just 18 months, Chances Are won 36 BIS, and after going BOB at the U. S. Specialty in New York in 1969, and BOB and

GR1 the next day at Westminster, he was retired. Already his puppies are beginning to win as two of his California puppies have BIM with about 1000 entered, and one of his daughters was BOW at the SoCal Specialty. So far this year, we have only one BIS win for a Kerry, the Florida win of Ch. Mr. Fitz of Pequest in January.

Registrations for 1968 as reported in March, 1969, showed a small decline. I think that this is healthy so far as quality of puppies is concerned, as the pet mills and shops do not seem interested in our breed. However, I would feel better if our breed would not chart any seasonal increases, but would at least keep even with the average increase of all breeds.

One problem has arisen, and that is scania—is it inherited, where did it come from, how much do we have of it? Our U. S. Club has done the scania thing by calling a meeting of all the members, to be held at Chagrin with the U. S. Specialty, and invited a professor of genetics from Cornell to talk to us. This is the way to face a problem like this—to find out all about it and what should be done to correct it. So far as we know, now, it started in only one kennel and is not widespread.

Presented below is the annual Register of Merit Sires, each with at least 5 champion get, and the Register of Merit Dams, each with at least 3 champion get, with all sires and dams, still alive. We have at last a good card system for the RCM, but ask your help in notifying us if any sire or dam dies.

How proud we can be that four of our breed earned the Companion Dog Excellent this year. They were Ch. Gay Way's Merry Bridget, Cricket of Pine Run, Bolina's Windward Mist, and Elbieley's Southern Belle. There were eighteen others who qualified for the Companion Dog degree, including Ch. Elbieley's Vandryke, Ch. Blue Banner of Tipperary, and Ch. Danwyn's Little Coby. It would be even better for our breed if there were more obedience degree winners than new champions.
